The Coming of Spring – God's Renewal by Mike Barker

For many of us, the arrival of spring is often a welcome relief following the cold winter months. The warmer sunny days, the buds and blossoms on the trees, and the scurrying around of small animals, all signal that life is waking up by this seasonal change. Yet, one aspect of springtime that is not always pleasant is the revival of stinging insects. Wasps are avoided like the plague, especially by those allergic to their sting. Yet, honeybees are regarded differently. While we would never want, nor would we invite their sting, the honey they make is a delightful addition to our tables.

If you've ever noticed the cells in the hives of the honeybee, you will see that they are shaped as a hexagon. As such, they can hold the queen bee's eggs as well as store the pollen the worker bees bring to the hive as well as the honey that is produced. The geometry of the hexagon uses the smallest amount of material to hold the greatest amount of weight. These bees are also pollinators, and as such occupy an important place in the reproductive cycle of our plants. Given a life expectancy of approximately 6 weeks, it takes a large number of bees to work the hives, make a pound of honey, and pollinate our plants.

While wasps are not as welcomed as the honeybee, they are among the most industrious when it comes to building nests. They build their nests from wood fiber, which explains why they often build them near or on our houses. The queen wasp scrapes fiber from wood materials, then she chews it and mixes it with her saliva to create the paper pulp she uses to build her nest. She spits the pulp onto the desired build site to shape and form the nest. Just as the honeybee, the wasp builds the individual cells in hexagonal form, utilizing the advantages of that design.

Was it mere coincidence that the honeybee and wasp came to build their shelters with such precision, or was it an evolutionary process passed along to each successive generation? Neither coincidence nor evolution can explain how they've acquired the ability to make honey or build shelters. Given the integrity and design of their life cycles, the most logical conclusion is that it is part of the network God set in place when He created this marvelously complex universe. The example of the honeybee and the wasp give testimony to an intelligent God who designed it all, including the life cycle of these industrious insects.
